Flagship

Day Center, Wellness Center, 51 units of affordable housing for families, 44 units of permanent supportive housing, 12 units of recovery housing, and 9 units of mental health focused housing.

Erna's House

30 efficiencies and one-bedroom apartments for the most vulnerable women in the city.

NEW Diane's House 42 units of permanent supportive housing including 6 units for families.

NEW Capitol Vista NEW Adam's

21 units of permanent supportive housing with on-site care and services provided by N Street Village staff. EW Adam's Place for Women Temporary emergency shelter with 30 beds and 24/7 services provided by N Street Village staff.

Homelessness at the National Level – who and how many?

2020 estimate:

- The January PIT snapshot: 580,466 people experiencing homelessness Point-in-time estimates; not annualized number
- 2/3 of those who are homeless are single "unaccompanied adults"
- Of those individuals about 20% qualify as "chronically homeless"
- And about 39% of those individuals are women
- About 202,623 single adults experiencing homelessness are over age 50
- Affordable housing and supportive housing are the answers
- Short-term vs. Permanent rental assistance; social service assistance options

Homelessness at the National Level – entering and exiting

Who is at risk?

- Those spending more than 1/3 of their income on housing costs
 - National estimate ~ 7 million units short in affordable housing supply
 - 50% of poor households spend more than 50% of their income for rent

Individual vulnerabilities, e.g: Disability, age, history of institutionalization, LGBTQ youth; trauma/DV

Exiting Homelessness:

- the majority of people who become homeless "self-resolve" and do not return
- most others have disabling conditions and are at risk of chronic homelessness

Current DC Data on Homelessness

2019 Data and Information

- Total persons: 6,521 (5% decrease over prior year)
- Single adults 3,862 (3% increase over prior year)
- 26% of singles are women, 44% are "chronically homeless"
- Homeward DC 2015-2020 our strategic plan (progress: families, veterans)

Women Specifically

- Last two years = an increase in numbers of women coming for emergency shelter
- 2018 study found => 200 bed deficit for women with special needs
- 16% increase in women over age 50 in the past two years
- Greatest needs : health, behavioral health/trauma, age-related; medical respite
- Many women coming from other jurisdictions; regional movement and "travellers"
